Benefits to Reeping it Clean

To the true Harley enthusiast your bike is more than just mere transportation; it's a part of who you are, not to mention the substantial investment you have put into it. That's why keeping it clean and looking good is just one of several benefits as it is just as important to keeping it running good.

Paint contamination consists of any airborne chemical compounds, ferrous (iron containing) particles, adhesives, industrial fallout, rail dust, acid rain, bird droppings, road tar, grime, tree sap, bugs, water spots, brake dust, oil, to name a few on the bikes paint surface can slowly embed into the paint surface. The first benefit to keeping it clean is protecting its finish, and some of these contaminants that come in contact with the bikes paint and finish, particularly fresh contaminants, may come off the paint surface with the initial washing. Some other contaminants, however, will actually penetrate and or bond to the paint and, over time, eat into the clear coat thereby causing pitting, premature clear coat failure, and or overall accelerating the degradation of the paint.

Getting to know your bike during a good cleaning is the second benefit to keeping it clean. While cleaning your bike, this presents a great opportunity to look at all the individual parts (engine, suspension, brakes, wheels and tires, wiring, hosing, and bracketing, and drive belt) making sure they are tight and secure, but not cracked, loose, worn, frayed, leaking or showing any signs of premature failure.

Even with the best intentions, you can actually damage your bike if you don't clean it correctly. Giving your bike a thorough cleaning once a month is always best keeping in mind it will take several hours from start to finish. There are some good hard fast rules to cleaning a bike and some crazy ways I have seen bikes cleaned. Taking your bike to a "do it yourself carwash" is not one of the better ideas. Using dirty rags, harsh detergents, and not pre-rinsing your bike especially in neglected areas can cause scratching, dulling, and even corrosion.

Always begin washing your bike with Harley recommend cleaning products for best results while the bike is cold and never hot as this can cause injuries to you and possible damage to the bikes engine. Avoid direct sun and heat of the day; avoid washing in the street as it's safer to do in the driveway. Start by removing all jewelry, rings, belt buckles, clothing that can cause scratching to the bikes paint surfaces.

Always use micro fiber towels as I find this the best way to get into the small areas where the soft sponge can not and it's a safe soft towel that will avoid scratching to the paints surface. Please beware that there are numerous areas that have sharp edges that can cause injuries so take your time and mind those areas. When pre-rinsing and rinsing use a light spray from the hose nozzle and not directing spray into sensitive areas such as the radio, speakers and electrical connections. I have found that hand cleaning the tires and wheels with the same bike wash is best while the bike is on a center jack (K&L MC450 Center Jack) as you can easily turn the wheels as you clean.

Once washed and dried, using the Harley Davidson Glaze and Poly Sealant with a damp clean micro fiber towel doing small areas at a time will help place a nice protection barrier on the bikes paint, chrome, and wheel surfaces for the next wash.

The third a final benefit to a sharp clean Harley; is riding and getting the looks and appraise from motorists and or people walking giving thumbs up. A clean ride is a well maintain ride.


harley Officers Training

We returned from Harley Officers Training and what a wonderful experience it was for me. I attended classes including "Accepting The Challenge Foundations 1 and 2", "Conflict: Throttle Through The Nonsense", "Forging The Dealer/Chapter Relationship", "H.O.G. Finance", "Effective Communication" and "Risk" to name a few. I attend many seminars to keep up my nursing license and other teaching classes, but this really was so good and motivating to me that it was worth my time and money to attend. I honestly got something out of every class I attended. It was two full days of learning, learning to help make our chapter better!

What I took away from the experience is that we do some things wrong and that we do many things right! I learned that not only am I a treasurer for the chapter, but that I am here to help promote and maintain the chapter.

I want to tell you about some important facts as chapter members we need to consider and do:

- · Fun, Fun Fun...it's about riding and having fun as a chapter!
- Be aware of the chapter image when you are out and about wearing your vests.
- We need to maintain positive talk about our dealership, support our dealership because without them we truly are nothing.
- · One negative comment from a person can lead to negativity in the group.
- Avoid hear say and rumors, go to the horses mouth and ask the important questions, one on one. If you have an issue, talk one on one with that person.
- Make sure you have personal insurance to cover you in the event of an incident on the road. I found out the importance of the waivers and although I have heard Vince preach about it for a long time, I heard from the attorney for HOG truly talk its importance. The insurance covers the dealership, but you could be held responsible for some situations on the ride. The big one is drinking or any type of substance or prescription abuse. If you are in an accident or cause one and your medical records are reviewed and it's found you're on even "medical marijuana" it will void the insurance. Thus leading you in a rabbit hole. So, please have proper insurance on your bike and yourself.
- Closed rides, I really didn't understand its meaning. I do now, 'closed' means just chapter current members in good standing with the chapter and national HOG. If you're not current you must sign a waiver at each ride.



Chapter Retention: I heard many other chapters talk about how hard it was to grow the chapter and retain members. Here are a few reasons people leave:

- · They can't afford the expense of going on a ride and eating out each time.
- · The negative talk in the chapter, they just get tired of it.
- · They are older and can't ride anymore.
- They don't like the drinking and it worries them enough to leave. People say they leave because they can't drink, when really its the opposite according to HOG.

So the question is how do we recruit new members? One simple way is, if you are at the dealership and you see someone you don't recognize from the chapter go over and start a conversation. Tell them about the chapter, invite them on a ride. Give them a card from the chapter, we have plenty of business cards to share, just ask for some. We must promote within ourselves!

Okay, I hope you see my enthusiasm for the chapter and my commitment to the chapter is now stronger than ever. 

The Harley-Davidson Motor Co. Archive Collection

During the last century there were more than 150 domestic motorcycle manufacturers in the United States, 7 of which were located in Milwaukee, WI, the same city in which Harley and the Davidsons began building motorcycles. As with most industries in their infancy, the majority of



these motorcycle companies were short lived. Harley Davidson has sufficient capital and was able to develop an outstanding distribution network and market. By 1920, Harley Davidson had become the largest motorcycle manufacturer in the world, and by 1953, there were just two American motorcycle manufacturers left standing: Harley Davidson and Indian. Today, Harley Davidson corporate offices occupy the same buildings than began as the Juneau Avenue factory, which are just a stones-throw away from the location of the original shed.



From the very beginning, all things Harley Davidson came from Milwaukee. By 1973, when vehicle manufacturing moved to York, PA, more than 1.25 million motorcycles had been built and shipped from this site. The Juneau Avenue Complex, as it is now called, is listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Housed in the 3800 Building is the Harley Davidson Archives, a 3,100 square foot area containing the company history in the form of historic corporate documents, literature dating back to 1905, service manuals, owner manuals, tens of thousands of images and photo negatives, point of sale and advertising materials, dealer

correspondence, rider apparel, and all manner of Harley Davidson collectables. This collection creates a rare historic timeline, preserved from the very early years of the company.

A separate space houses the vehicle collection, and above the padlocked gate, a sign reads: "Through this gate pass the oldest and greatest motorcycles in the world!" Many have speculated over the years why the vehicle collection was started, a question for which there is no concrete explanation. Whatever the reason, the fact remains that it does exist, and it includes more than 460 vehicles. The core of the





collection consists of vehicles from 1915- the year the collection was started- to the present. Most of these vehicles were taken directly from the production line and, in some instances, may have been engineering prototypes or test units. Vehicles from 1914 back to 1905 were actually re-purchased, either from owners or dealers. To this day, at least one vehicle from each model year takes its place within the collection. There are special interest vehicles, as well as a Harley Davidson boat, snow mobiles, gold cars, police vehicles, and prototype models that never saw their way to production. There are special, one-off customs used for advertising or dealer point of sale. No other motor vehicle manufacturer has the foresight to save what Harley Davidson has saved for more than 100 years. The archives chronicle more than just Harley Davidson history, they represent the evolution of technology, styling, advertising, and product development. Most importantly however, is that the collections reflect the lives of those who built, sold, and rode a true American legend. The dealers and riders keep the legend alive.

Today, HOG members can view the Harley Davidson collection and vehicle archive when visiting the Harley Davidson Museum in Milwaukee, WI. A walk through the Harley Davidson Museum is a walk through the history of America. With an unrivaled collection of Harley Davidson motorcycles and memorabilia, a 20 acre park-like campus, and a calendar full of activities, the HD Museum is one of

Milwaukee's top tourist destination from visitors from around the globe. A visit to the museum is an experience that will stay with you for a lifetime.



THE ALL NEW RIDE 365

Ride 365 is HOG's Official Mileage Recognition Program for 2018 which includes the Lifetime Mileage Recognition Program (which most HOG Members have joined) but has two new mileage programs built into it.

The Annual Mileage Recognition (which is an individual mileage program) rewards HOG Members throughout the year for meeting various mileage milestones (very similar to the Lifetime Mileage Program). The Annual Chapter Challenge Mileage Program makes things a little interesting by adding a competitive element among HOG Chapters. Each Chapter Member that is signed up for the *Ride365* is eligible for the Annual Chapter Challenge as all Chapter Members Mileage is added to a total Chapter Mileage. There two elements to this program a Highest Total Mileage and a Highest Average Mileage per Member where one chapter could win one or both. Both these new programs start January 1st of every year and runs through December 31st and you validate your mileage at any HD Dealership.




